The tragic loss of Leading Senior Constable Neal THOMPSON and Senior Constable Vadim de WAART-HOTTART and the severe injuring of a third at Porepunkah in recent weeks is a reminder of the dangers faced by the officers of Victoria Police every day across the state. I extend my deepest sympathies to all members of Victoria Police following the horrific incident in north-east Victoria and the tragic loss of two dedicated officers, Senior Constable Vadim de Waart-Hottart and Detective Leading Senior Constable Neal Thompson, who died while on duty in August.

Like many in the Bellarine community, I am incredibly grateful for the continued service and dedication of Victoria Police members.

Our local police work tirelessly around the clock to keep the Bellarine safe. While our region is a supportive and close-knit community, we are not immune to challenges such as theft, scams, road safety concerns, and domestic and family violence.

I regularly meet with local police and chair bSafe, a community-led group that connects Bellarine organisations and community members directly with law enforcement. bSafe provides an important platform for collaboration, communication, and proactive problem-solving.

In addition to working closely with Victoria Police, I also meet regularly with other emergency services including CFA, Ambulance Victoria, SES, Coast Guard and Fire Rescue Victoria who all play a vital role in supporting our community. These services work together with a strong sense of cooperation and shared purpose to ensure the safety and wellbeing of everyone in the Bellarine.

Our next bSafe quarterly meeting is scheduled for October, and I look forward to sharing updates with the community on the key topics discussed and any actions arising.

FUNERAL SCAMS

At a recent meeting with our Register's sponsor, Kings Funerals, Beth King urged us to share with our Registrants and the community, to be aware of funeral scams targeting grieving families and friends.

Fake live stream memorials are a type of funeral scam where fraudsters send out bogus links to live-streamed funeral services, often via social media, to trick mourners into paying for access or making donations to fake accounts. These scammers operate by scanning public funeral notices and creating fake profiles that pose as family members, then send friend requests and fake links to trick people out of money and personal information.

Australian Funeral Directors Association CEO Dale Gilson says scammers are using fake Facebook accounts with information and photos of the deceased, and may request information such as credit card details, and donations to family members.

The association says funeral directors have been issuing warnings to families and their communities after being alerted to scams targeting their businesses.

Fake GoFundMe and memorial sites are other ways scammers are attempting to prey on the grieving, and Mr Gilson recommended people always check the legitimacy of sites with family members before donating.

Since the COVID pandemic, online farewells have grown in popularity, allowing people to attend from any location.

To safely watch live streamed funerals, mourners should contact the funeral home directly for details. Keep in mind that funeral directors will never ask for personal or financial details through social media. If you ever doubt the legitimacy of live stream links or communications, contact your funeral director.

Anyone targeted is urged to report scam activity to <u>www.scamwatch.gov.au</u> and to the online platform where it occurred, such as Facebook.

Stay vigilant and protect yourself and your loved ones.

TRADIES - PROTECT YOUR TOOLS

TIME FOR ACTION - MARK AND IDENTIFY YOUR TOOLS

Don't leave tools unattended or in an unlocked vehicle. Criminals are opportunistic. If they see little risk and high value, your tools are gone. During 2019 there were 20,000 reports of stolen tradies tools. Many of these were from vehicles.

Keep your vehicle locked, your tools out of sight, and both in a lock up garage.

Mark your tools and keep a record

Clearly mark your tools with a unique identifier, such as your driver's licence number with a "V" before it. Use an engraver or a UV pen. These are available from Neighbourhood Watch.

While marking your tools might not prevent them from theft, it can make them less attractive to steal as it can lower their value and make it harder for thieves to resell them. It's also easier for police to identify your tools and return them to you when stolen and recovered.

Put a sign or sticker on your ute or toolbox saying all equipment and tools are marked. These are available from Neighbourhood Watch Greater Geelong. Email us at nhwgreatergeelong@gmail.com

Consider popping expensive tools inside your home overnight or on the weekend.

You can also look at using data dots – unique identification numbers encoded on polyester substrate to form microdots that act much like DNA.

Property Vault – www.propertyvault.com.au offers an online "vault' in which to record your tools, etc. Take a look.

Consider adding an air tag to tradies trailers and tool boxes.

Taking photos of your tools and identifiable features can also help police track them down in the event they have been stolen.



Surely the Bellarine and Portarlington Police cannot be far off getting our hands on one of these to park at Gateway Plaza! The Lykan Hypersport is one of the fastest and costliest global supercars. The Abu Dhabi police force got its hands on this beast that gets a flat-six 3.7 litre engine making 770 hp and 960 Nm. It can touch 100 kmph in only 2.8 seconds and has a top speed of 385 kmph.
